Building a national learning community for Canada's economic and social prosperity

Background: Building Sustainable Futures is a national project that was launched in March 2014 by YWCA Toronto's Skills Development Centre and is funded by the Government of Canada's Adult Learning, Literacy and Essential Skills Program. This project aims to replicate new promising practices in essential skills programming among YM/YWCA Associations in nine cities across Canada.

For over a decade, YWCA's Skills Development Centre has been pioneering Essential Skills for Employment training to support vulnerable individuals. We continue to assist marginalized women, particularly mature job seekers, youth and immigrants to compete for jobs in today's knowledge-based economy and to achieve more sustainable participation in the broader economy and society.

Through this project, the Skills Development Centre is able to share best practices and learning nationally. YM/YWCA Associations have adapted the Skills Development Centre model to their unique employment programs, and in turn are contributing to building sustainable futures for job seekers throughout Canada.

YWCA Toronto's Skills Development Centre is facilitating a national initiative which includes the following YM-YWCA Collaborators:

YWCA Halifax (NS), YWCA Hamilton (ON), YWCA Agvvik (Iqaluit, NU), YMCA/YWCA National Capital Region (ON), YWCA St. John/Moncton (NB), YWCA Saskatoon (SK), YWCA Thompson (MB), YWCA Toronto (ON), and YWCA Vancouver (BC).

Looking Ahead:

Promising and Emerging Practices

Today, promising practices and learning are already surfacing across the project's nine collaborative partners who remain committed to building the capacity of Essential Skills programming, across Canada. The emerging practices and learning aim to demonstrate **impact on three levels**: improved participant livelihoods, organizational livelihoods, and community livelihoods. Evaluation research from the program will be published in the summer of 2017. The goal is also to replicate the essential employment skills program on a local and national scale, in order to build a skilled and inclusive workforce in Canada.



Building a National Learning Collaborative: Sharing the Stories

YWCA Agvvik (Nunavut)

An Indigenous woman in Agvvik, NU was assisted by YWCA Iqaluit's *Sewing to Success* program, which has embedded building sustainable futures and Inuit tradition into their employment skills model. She gained the strength to move out of an abusive situation, and also developed the skills and confidence to start her own small business.

YWCA Saskatoon (Saskatchewan)

YWCA Saskatoon's *Hospitality Boot Camp* adapted the building sustainable futures model into their sector-specific training program. A newcomer who was experiencing language issues and low self-esteem shared that the program supported him to gain hands-on employment experience. Today, he is happily employed and able to further settle into his new life in Canada.
