As we close out our 150th anniversary year, I cannot help but feel incredibly proud of everything we have accomplished. This past year has given us an opportunity to reflect on our accomplishments and provided us with a clear vision of our path forward.

Alongside community partners, suvivors and loved ones of those lost to femicide. we led an urgent call to action for the City of Toronto to declare intimate partner and gender-based violence an epidemic, and under our new Mayor's leadership, we saw this declaration become a reality. To me, Toronto City Council unanimously supporting Mayor Olivia Chow's motion to make the declaration, signals hope. However, we also know that living in the city is getting harder and harder for many women, girls and gender diverse people as affordable housing becomes scarcer and the cost of living continues to rise.

While the prospect of facing these growing challenges is daunting, YWCA Toronto has the necessary knowledge, capable staff and a committed

# SPARKING LASTING CHANGE

We continued the celebration of YWCA Toronto's 150th anniversary recently by posing a reflective question to a group of fiercely feminist leaders united in their work—our program directors. When asked "how has your department sparked change in the community?" their answers not only showcased hard won accomplishments over the years but also offered powerful evidence of what we can do when we have the support of a dedicated community of donors like you.

## Nina Gorka, Director of Shelters & Clinical Services

In 2018, we opened a new emergency shelter for women and gender diverse people, addressing a gap in the Toronto shelter scene. This change added 72 much-needed beds to the shelter system.

Our community programs, Breakthrough and Choices for Living, have not only given non-traditional, arts-based therapeutic interventions to participants often weary of traditional methods of healing, but Choices for Living's success gave us the opportunity to begin the proposal process for what is now our largest housing program, the Elm Centre complex.

## Tsering Tsomo, Director of Employment & Training

Since 1873, YWCA Toronto has been responding to the changing needs of women in our community by designing specialized training and employment programs. We currently offer more than 16 programs to assist a diverse population of participants build stronger economic futures across the city. Our programs have helped countless women and gender diverse people access training in skilled trades, information technology and digital skills for the workplace, while also helping them to develop successful job search strategies, improve their English language skills and access employment and settlement support for newcomers.

#### Sami Pritchard, Interim Director of Advocacy & Communications

YWCA Toronto has long been an advocate for social change. In the 1960s and 1970s, we supported prochoice and birth control movements. In 1978, we made our anti-apartheid stance on South Africa known, and we helped establish some of the first International Women's Day activities in Toronto. Since the '80s, we have called for universal child care and held the position that a national child care system is essential for a women's full economic and social participation. More recently, Toronto City Council passed a motion declaring Intimate Partner Violence and Gender-Based Violence an epidemic in Toronto. We are thrilled to share this significant

step toward ending gender-based violence with our fellow feminist advocates, organizations and survivors in Toronto.

None of these accomplishments would have been possible without the solid foundation of donor support you provide. Your belief in our work has allowed us to help women, girls and gender diverse people in their times of greatest need while also creating change on a broader, systemic level. Thank you for making this possible.

## **Program Highlights:**

Each summer, more than **500 girls and gender diverse youth** have the opportunity to challenge themselves, explore new skills, experience nature and make lasting friendships at YWCA Toronto's Camp Tapawingo.



Last year, **93 parents and children strengthened family bonds** in our Teen Mothers program, while mothers and gender diverse parents enhanced their parenting skills, self-confidence and knowledge of childhood development.





In the last five years alone, YWCA Toronto's Girls' Centre has provided more than **850 educational workshops** to help girls and gender diverse youth improve their skills, build confidence and realize new possibilities.
